The CyberLynx Scholarship

The CyberLynx Scholarship Program is a competitive scholarship that offers additional college opportunities for our full-time high school students. This program will pay for one course of the student's choice from any **University of Alaska** system campus. This scholarship is awarded twice a year, and the deadlines for submitting applications are December 1 for scholarships to be used during the following spring semester and April 1 for scholarships to be used during the following summer semester or the following fall semester. If exceptional circumstances or considerations are needed due to college schedules, the CyberLynx Principal may allow for the use of this scholarship during a semester other than those designated above.

Up to three scholarships may be awarded for the spring semester, and up to three may be awarded for the summer/fall semesters. A student may only be awarded the CyberLynx scholarship once during their high school career with CyberLynx. Students may apply for this scholarship as many times as they wish; one application per semester. Scholarships only cover the cost of tuition for a single 3-credit (or fewer) course at the 100-200 level at the Alaska Resident rate (books and lab fees can be paid from the student's allotment). The course covered by the scholarship must be added to the PER. Scholarships are paid directly to the University of Alaska institution providing the course, and students will receive both high school and college credit for these courses.

Qualifications:

- A student must be enrolled full-time (at least four courses) throughout the school year.
- They must be enrolled before October 1 of the school year.
- Applicants must be in good academic standing with a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0.
- The student must be a sophomore with at least 5.5 credits at the time of application.
